Kornegay Makes Claim On Smoking

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — A spokesman for the tobacco industry maintains that the link between cigarette smoking and cancer is "not a closed case."

Horace R. Kornegay, president of the Tobacco Institute, reiterated claims by tobacco manufacturers that no research has furnished absolute proof that smoking causes lung cancer.

Kornegay commented Thursday following a presentation by the institute in Atlanta.

He pointed out that the Japanese have increased their cigarette smoking 48 per cent in recent years, while heart disease during the same period has decreased 27 per cent.

Kornegay admitted, however, that cigarettes are "not above scientific suspicion" as a possible cancer cause.

Kornegay Asserts Leaf-Cancer Link 'Still On Trial'

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Tobacco Institute President Horace R. Kornegay Thursday contended the relationship between cigarettes and cancer is "still on trial."

Kornegay, head of the group which represents the cigarette industry, made his remarks following a presentation by the organization aimed at showing that the case against smoking is "not a closed case."

However, Kornegay added, cigarettes are "not above scientific suspicion" as a factor related to cancer.

Reiterating standing claims by the tobacco industry, he said no research has proven irrevocably that smoking causes lung cancer.

On the relationship between smoking and heart disease, he said that cigarette smoking in Japan has increased 48 per cent in recent years but that heart disease has dropped 27 per cent during the same period.
